

Our strategic plan provides a guide for advancing equity for women and girls, and we've made significant progress in many areas, including adding a second Tech Trek camp last summer.

This year, changes at AAUW National will create even more opportunities for both the state and your branch to take on a larger role empowering women and girls:

• Five Star National Recognition Program. National's new program recognizes states and branches for completing certain activities that align with the mission of advancing gender equity for women and girls. Check the priorities listed at www.aauw.org/resource/five-star-national-recognition-program/ to see which your branch can pursue.

Most branches can easily attain the communications, public policy, and program stars – and AAUW FL is prepared to help. We're hosting regular conference calls in the various leadership areas and can make branch visits to mentor your leadership teams. Our state strategic plan now includes many of the Five Star priorities. As your branch decides how you'll support the program, let me know so we can track and share your successes, celebrating the best practices you develop.

- Work Smart. We've set a state goal of training 3,000 people with the Work Smart Online salary negotiation workshop <u>salary.aauw.org</u>. Share the link with other members and all your contacts. Add it to your website, Facebook, and email. Offer an online event at your library or local college, or branch meeting. Even retirees will benefit from the negotiation skills in the workshop, which takes a little more than a hour.
- Economic security research. AAUW FL will again be working with Mary Gatta, associate professor of sociology at The City University of New York, this time to conduct research about the economic security of African-American women. (See page 6.)
- **Reading for results.** National has a new non-fiction book club Operation Equity: Reading for Results providing ideas and activities for your branch www.aauw.org/resource/operation-equity/.

State Election Results

Open board positions filled by acclamation

Candidates for the four open positions on the state board of directors were filled by acclamation at the April Leadership Conference in Ocala.

Their two-year terms began July 1. Since they ran unopposed, their names did not have to be included in the One Member One Vote initiative, which allows members not at a conference or convention to vote online or by paper ballot for a month after the annual meeting closes.

Patricia DeWitt, from

Jacksonville, is president-elect. She will take over as president at the end of current president Patricia Ross' term. She also currently serves as chair of the AAUW FL Economic Security Committee.

Bea Holt is the new director for program. She is a member of the Venice branch.

Kathy VanderVliet, our current director for finance, was elected to another term and is a member of the Jacksonville branch.

Kay Lee-Smith, of Tampa, is

our new director for public policy. She was nominated at the conference because the previous candidate withdrew.

As a result, information about her that would have been in the pre-conference issue of *floriVision* distributed in February could not be included. You can now read about her qualifications and experience on *page 5*.

Bylaws amendments approved with few votes cast

Bylaws may not offer the most exciting read, but they're essential: They establish the detailed rules for how an organization operates.

Two changes to the AAUW FL bylaws proposed by the bylaws committee were placed on the ballot for voting that began May 15, after our April leadership conference, and closed June 15.

Both proposed changes passed, with just 174 of 1,983 eligible members voting. The low number, however, met the quorum requirement of at least 5 percent. Members as of March 15 could vote online or by paper ballot.

Below is a summary of the changes. For details, see the voter guide in the February floriVision, page 6. The complete bylaws are at https://aauw-fl.aauw.net/bylaws/

• **Elections.** The change to Article VIII, Nominations and Elections, Section 2, b, deletes "president" as one of the positions to be elected in odd-numbered years. Just one vote was cast against.

By tradition and practice, the president-elect assumes duty without another election, so the amendment clarifies, but doesn't change the process. It also eliminates confusion with another bylaws section.

• Public policy priorities. The change to Article XVI, Meetings of AAUW Florida, Section 3, b, eliminates the biennial vote on public policy priorities at the annual meeting. Five votes were cast opposing.

Our members have for the past two biennials adopted AAUW National's priorities instead of preparing our own. The change continues the practice without the need for a vote every two years. National's is adopted by member vote, so there's no need for duplication. ■

Is your address correct?

Ballots for our elections are sent to members using the email and postal addresses in the Member Services Database at www.aauw.org, but 225 were undeliverable for the last election.

Catch the Wave in Daytona Beach



The 2019-2021 AAUW Public Policy Priorities adopted in May through a national every-member vote sets the framework for our work in Florida, at both the state and branch level.

The state public policy committee is planning programming to:

- Advocate and represent the priorities to policy makers, AAUW members, the public, and media.
- Organize members and supporters to take action on public policy matters.
- Lead AAUW voter education and the get-out the vote (GOTV) campaign for Florida.

Plan to attend Lobby Days.

Our annual Lobby Days trip to the State Capitol in Tallahassee offers an exciting, personal way to advocate directly to our representatives.

We'd have a greater impact if each branch were represented for the 2020 event, set for Tuesday, Jan. 21, and Wednesday, Jan. 22, the second week of the legislative session. You should arrive in Tallahassee on Monday night, Jan. 20, for a

training session. Additional details will be forthcoming.

It's a commitment of time and money, so AAUW FL offers a small stipend to help offset travel costs.

Participate in conference calls.

The committee will host conference calls on the who-what-where-when-why-and-how of public policy. We hope to gain insight on how we can best serve branch public policy chairs and members.

The calls are designed to assist in advocacy efforts, answer questions, and share best practices. Be on the lookout for conference call details.

Third study focuses on Florida women's economic security

We're sponsoring another study by Mary Gatta on women's economic security in Florida, this one about the economic challenges of black women.

Gatta is associate professor of sociology at The City University of New York, and widely known for her research on gender, workforce, education, and aging.

She has conducted two previous studies about the economic security of Florida women, one dealing with elder women and the other about Hispanic women.

The first, "Women, Economic Insecurity and Aging in the Florida Sunshine," was conducted for our St. Augustine and Jacksonville branches and released in 2018.

The second, "<u>Hispanic Women:</u> Striving But Not Economically Thriving," was released in May and supported by our Daytona Beach, Jacksonville, and St. Augustine branches and a grant from AAUW FL.

The need for the new research was revealed after women's economic security committee

members studied Gatta's report on Hispanic women. It was obvious that women in the Black census category also experienced economic challenges. It was also clear that there were key differences between these two ethnic groups.

Members of the committee discussed with Gatta the possibility of extending her work to cover black women in Florida, since much of the data had already been collected and analyzed.


As a result, this fall, up to seven branches (pending branch board meetings) are collaborating on raising funds and recruiting study subjects for the project. Gatta will conduct most of the interviews via phone or Skype, with possibly some in-person interviews in the Northeast Florida area.


The study will be completed in time for the April state convention. It will complete a three-part comprehensive study of the economic security of Florida elder women, Florida Hispanic women, and Florida black women We can be very proud of sponsoring this significant research.

Expansion brings 96 campers to Stetson, FAU

Tech Trek Florida hosted 96 girls this year at two camps. The first camp was held at Stetson University in DeLand under the leadership of Shawnrece Campbell. The second was at Florida Atlantic University in Jupiter this year with Sue Slone as camp director.

Both camps held Professional Women's Nights inviting STEM professionals from the area to eat with the girls, share their wisdom, and answer their questions. This is always a highlight of camp.

Field trips. The Stetson girls went on a field trip to the Marine Discovery Center in New Smyrna Beach, where they collected and evaluated water samples from the salt marsh and cruised the lagoon while learning about wildlife inhabitants.

For their field trip, the FAU girls visited Aerojet Rocketdyne aerospace facility in Jupiter for a tour and classes in rocketry and statistics. The girls were also able to eat lunch with women engineers and statisticians.



Core courses. Each camp had a variety of core courses for the girls to choose from, and all girls rotated through workshops in the afternoon.

Stetson offered core courses such as chemistry, rockets, computer coding, and water pollution, and workshops in civil engineering, DNA coding, robotics, physics, math, yoga, zumba, herbarium, and 3D printing.

FAU campers chose from marine biology, neuroscience, coding, and engineering core courses and rotated through cyber security, sponsored by Symantec; finance offered by women from Wells Fargo Bank; and neuroscience, zumba, chemistry, DNA, and Power Point presentation.

Evenings were filled with a variety of activities, including

preparing for Professional Women's Night and writing thank you notes to our supporters.

The girls made new friends, learned a great deal and had the oncollege campus experience. The camp is an experience they will remember for a very long time.
